Easter week we welcomed Poor Clare Sisters from Cincinnati. They are also a community of nine sisters and have a monastery on the grounds of the Franciscan friars. The ACS has held a Cluster Meeting at their facility, and the wooded area surrounding their building is beautiful.

Gerontology: Marcie, Helen and Jean Alice attended the April ACS Cluster Meeting in Louisville, Kentucky. Jane Thibault spoke on "Dedicated Suffering: transforming pain into positive energy for others." Jane is the president of the Secular Order of Carmelites in Louisville and holds a doctorate in Clinical Gerontology. She has developed a process of sharing that enables the elderly and others who have physical sufferings and a tendency to feel useless to get together and turn this suffering into energy to help specific people. She stresses with each group that they should not look for results but be grateful if there are any. It often has the effect of lessening the aches and pains of the participants because they do not feel so alone in their trials. She calls this "Dedicated Suffering."

Jean Alice: "My response at the meeting was to tell the group that for several years the focus of ACS and CCA has been on "transformation of consciousness" and recognition of a world of energy available for this transformation. I think this is going on all over but under different labels. I told Jane that I think her process is one of them.

**Transportation**: Oldenburg offers no transportation services, and when we are short on drivers, we are hiring a Franciscan sister to drive us. This continues to be a happy answer to our need and to hers as she looks for a permanent job.

#### **VISITORS**

On Good Friday we had five different groups coming to the monastery, either

as part of their "Stations" or to pray in the chapel. Many were Haitians (many of our parishioners are from Haiti) and were feeling the agony of their people at this time.

A sight-seeing trolley arrived at the monastery with a group of about thirty people, part of "Tour Roxbury," which is now a part of "Tour Boston." We'd been asked some time in advance to share with them about our life and the history of our Order.

We have a young woman visiting who has hopes of being able to join us. **FORMATION** 

Our inter-community meetings have included input and discussion from the following: Fr. Richard Lennan from Boston College on the theology of the Church; Tom Massaro on the social justice encyclical of Pope Benedict XVI; Sr. Vilma, OCD on mysticism and our Carmelite saints; Michael Boughton, SJ, director of the Ignatian Institute at BC, on Catholic novelists as a way to approach our faith; Fr. Kieran, OCD on our Holy Mother; Fr. Sal, OCD on Brother Lawrence; Fr. George Evans from the delayed vocations seminary (JohnXXIII) on grace and holiness; Fr. Marc Foley, OCD on St. Thérèse. We will close the year with Fr. Richard Lennan and Sr. Mary Johnson, SND.

The McCarthy Chair lecturer this year was Margaret Jennings, a Brooklyn native and a medievalist educated at, among other places, Oxford, Harvard, Notre Dame and Bryn Mawr. She spoke on inclusivity as seen in the Cathedral of St. Stephan (or St. Etienne) in Bourges,

France. We were not quite sure what to expect from the title, but the lecture proved fascinating and the speaker's personality delightful. The artwork in the cathedral clearly depicted Judaism as integral to Christianity and salvation as being open to all at a time when it was often depicted as a Christian prerogative. I read later that St. Anthony spoke there during a council and as he finished, turned to the archbishop and soundly reprimanded him for his failings. The archbishop listened and wept.

Fr. Bonaventure, OCD came from the friars in Brighton and showed a wonderful program he has done on the Order's presence on Mount Carmel. He had many shots of the "dig" that we had never seen and wonderful photos of the friars' two monasteries there. It was a real pilgrimage.

would also like to send a sincere, but overdue "Welcome to CCA!" to our sisters of the San Rafael Carmel.

Did any of the rest of you feel like you had someone else's winter this year? Having only been in Latrobe for five years, the first four of which we had bare ground at least one or two days every week, I was a little surprised to have two New England-type snowstorms dump about 5 feet of snow on us in the space

of a week, which stayed around for several months. After the first storm some friends loaned us sleds, and Srs. Joann, Mary and Shirley took advantage of them.

Our study of Holy Mother's **Life** has

been going very well. Our reading and community discussions are bringing out many new insights and fresh interpretations. We are amazed at how much "new" information we find with each reading of St. Teresa's works.

On March 19, a new Catholic radio station with the call letters WAOB (We Are One Body) went on the air in this area. It is part of a trend occurring across the country, with Catholic broadcasters buying radio stations in order to increase the reach of the Church's message. The daily broadcast schedule will include the Mass, prayer and teaching programming. Our Tuesday Morning Prayer, Mass and Evening Prayer are being recorded and broadcast over this station. We are one of a number of religious groups that are being recorded.

On April 16 Srs. Mary and Theodora were in their cells when a tremendous wind (clocked at 86 mph at the Latrobe Airport) blew through our back yard and took down two very large pine trees. Actually, it didn't so much take them down as snap them off. They both recounted how as they watched from their window the first tree (about 35 feet tall) bent at a 90 degree angle about six feet off the ground and

snapped with the six feet of standing trunk splitting down the middle. The second tree, which was a little taller, bent at a 90 degree angle about eight feet off the ground. First about 15 feet of the top of the tree flew off and was deposited about 20 feet away and then the middle section snapped off. A third tree bent at a 90 degree angle but did not break.

Also in April we had a three-day visit from Rev. Xavier S. Devadass, OCD a Carmelite from India doing post-doctorial work in New York. In addition to giving us conferences and answering our questions about life, religion and Carmelites in India, he composed and dedicated a song to our Carmel. Besides teaching us to sing that song, he also sang an Offertory hymn and a Communion song in Hindu, which he composed. They were published and used in India.

On May 1 we had the joy of celebrating the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of profession of Sr. Mary of Jesus Crucified (Mary Wild). The jubilee Mass was celebrated by Fr. Jude Peters, OCD and the homily was given by Sister Mary's uncle, Fr. Robert Wild of Madonna House. There were eight Benedictine pri ests who also concelebrated. Sr. Mary's parents were overjoyed to have all their children and grandchildren together for the first time

### A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE MOTHER OF GOD CARMEL

Our Carmel was founded on November 24, 1965, from the Carmelite Monastery at Carmel-by-the-Sea. There were ten sisters who discerned the call for this venture

several years before making the foundation. They were inspired by Mother Miriam of the Trinity, OCD, who received a supernatural call to found a Carmel specifically to respond to Our Lady of Fatima's message to pray for the conversion of sinners and for the Russian people.

Archbishop Joseph T. McGucken graciously invited this group of nuns to the Archdiocese of San

Francisco and suggested a reliable contractor he knew to build a small monas-

were privileged to sing when two Jesuit priests of the Eastern Rite (Fr. Andrei Urusov, SJ, or Fr. Karl Patzelt, SJ, from the Russian Catholic Parish of Our Lady of Fatima) presided.

In those early days, the community hoped and prayed that they would be able to make a foundation in Russia. However, even before that Fr. Louis Bouier, on a visit to the monastery, suggested that perhaps the sisters should make a foundation in Finland, since the Iron Curtain made Russia impossible. Mother Virginia and another sister felt strongly called to follow this suggestion. On November 7, 1988 a foundation in Finland was successfully established.

When the miracle of the downfall of Communism took place, two of our sisters opened a tiny foundation in Moscow...finally fulfilling the dream of a presence in Russia.

However, after several years it became apparent that this venture was im-

tery for them. After some months of anticipation, the sisters finally arrived on a very rainy day and quickly moved in.

The next years were filled with great activity and enthusiasm. They continued to learn the Byzantine Liturgy, which they

practical, due to the impossibility of purchasing property in the countryside and of sending more sisters to Russia. The Divine Word Missionary Fathers purchased the apartment "monastery" and eventually also bought a nearby building, thus establishing St. Olga's Catholic Parish in downtown Moscow. We have been giving this "parish" our prayerful and practical support ever since.

At this time in our history, Our Lady's plea at Fatima is being answered by sharing our Russian roots with our sisters. Our present community consists of four American sisters, one sister from England, two sisters from Kenya, and one sister from Germany.

On the home front, we began very early in our presence here to plant redwood trees to create a place of peace and quiet. We now have a glorious forest of over 400 redwood trees. They provide a beautiful area for prayer and peaceful solitude for our enclosure. We have also developed a desktop printing enterprise, which has been very helpful as a means of support.

Our St. Joseph novena was a time of great grace and inspiring liturgies and homilies with a different number of priests presiding, although we were very happy and blessed to have Fr. Christopher LaRocca, OCD for the final three days. Father grew up in San Francisco and his family has been in the seafood business for many generations. So, on St. Joseph's feast day, the community was treated to a scrumptious meal, cooked by Father himself, of fresh halibut, shrimp, mussels and clams.

Soon we found ourselves fully immersed in Holy Week, the Easter Triduum and all the preparations for the great celebration of Our Lord's Paschal Mystery. Among other things, we prepared our tra-

ditional Russian Easter bread (Kulich) and cheese (Pascha).

Sr. Angelica was in need of surgery and with the great generosity of one of our doctor friends at the Geisinger Medical Center, all arrangements were being made. But we didn't know the day and time of surgery or the length of stay; and their visas had a time limit. But God's Providence took over! Within ten hours

The surgery was successful and Angelica was discharged five days later to Maria Hall. It seemed every major step flowed easily, one after the other. We are still in amazement.

The sights and sounds of Buea Carmel, as well as the "flavor" of Africa, came into our community room via DVDs which Rosa brought. One, particularly impressive, was the solemn profession of Sr. Maria Teresa, a young sister from Italy, the one non-African sister among six others in formation. The celebration was in the cathedral with the Bishop of Buea as celebrant. The cathedral was packed with scores of Bueans in colorful African prints. There was music—drums, guitar and organ—with singing from every heart and soul.

God's providence provided two beautiful snowfalls for our sisters so that the half dozen snowballs made earlier and frozen for a later display weren't needed! This visit holds many wonderful, happy memories!

Our Pat returned to Maria Hall in April, grateful for the welcome, openness and love she experienced from the sisters in Buea, grateful for the understanding of the sacrifice of their lives to build Carmel in Africa. We keep contact with Rosa and the nuns and are blessed to have them as special sisters.

Annually, our Bishop recognizes and honors sisters who are celebrating jubilees during the year. The sisters at Maria Hall do likewise. So, Srs. Anne and Angela (55 years and 50 respectively) participated in the planned celebrations, both at the Diocesan Center
