Dear Friends,

Our sister Saint Edith Stein, a German Jewish convert and a Carmelite, was smuggled to a monastery in the Netherlands on January 1, 1938. On September 14, 1939, she wrote an essay called *Hail Cross, Our Only Hope!* for her nuns. In it she asked them "whether we are still willing to honor what we promised in an hour of grace Will you remain faithful to the Crucified? Consider carefully! The world is in flames . . . the battle has broken into the open." She concludes her essay with these words:

Bound to him, you are omnipresent as he is. You cannot help here or there like the physician, the nurse, the priest. You can be at all fronts, wherever there is grief, in the power of the cross. Your compassionate love takes you everywhere, this love from the divine heart. Its precious blood is poured everywhere – soothing, healing, saving The eyes of the Crucified look down on you – asking, probing. Will you make your covenant with the Crucified anew in all seriousness?

As we walk along our Lenten journey in solidarity with the suffering people of Ukraine, Jesus invites all of us to make our covenant with him anew.

March 2022 Shared Services Update By Kate Asselin, GHR Grant Project Manager

As the Shared Services Collaborative (SSC) begins its second year, we are pleased to report that the project has achieved 100 percent participation, with all member communities engaging at least one of the primary services provided through Christian Brothers Services, including Accounting/Financial Services; Benefits Eligibility Management Services; and IT Support/Website Services.

Additional services offered this year include the Archival Mentoring program sponsored by Archivists for Congregations of Women Religious (ACWR), designed to guide communities in documenting, organizing, and preserving their heritage.

All of these services help to minimize time and energy devoted to business affairs and make it possible for the sisters to engage more fully in their vocation to the Carmelite spiritual life.

New SSC initiatives include a pilot project designed to help communities coordinate health care services and SSC membership expansion to other Carmelite communities and associations. A collaborative video project with Christian Brothers will feature the shared services model uniquely adapted for autonomous religious communities with diverse and changing needs. The SSC model was recently cited in an article published by the Resource Center for Religious Institutes (RCRI *Bulletin*, Winter 2021).

CCA Participation in the Synodal Process

On February 15, 2022, CCA sisters, along with Carmelite sisters from the UK, Scotland, New Zealand, and Australia, participated in our first ZOOM session to reflect on Pope Francis' call "For A Synodal Church." As part of our grateful response to his wonderful invitation to the People of God to walk together on our journey of life, we noted:

- The input from this first session makes clear that our sisters have the same hope and desire as Francis: That this worldwide synodal listening process will be a means of transformation for the whole church, a church that can awaken the world.
- Our lives witness to ultimate realities: our dependence on the Spirit and our hope in the transformative action of the Holy Spirit through personal and communal conversion.
- Following the thought of St. Teresa, we also said that we are called together to allow God's revelation in Scripture and in our interactions with others to shape the image of Jesus in us so that we can live life to the full.
- We have to allow ourselves to be transformed. We hope that this process will re-build the church from the ground up.

CCA Schedules its General Assembly

The CCA Leadership Team has announced that the CCA General Assembly will take place next April at the Bon Secours Retreat and Conference Center in Marriottsville, MD. Due to the pandemic this is the first time that the General Assembly will meet in person since its last in-person assembly in 2018. This gathering will provide a wonderful opportunity for the sisters to confer with each other regarding decisions that affect their life and how to continue to collaborate as an association to support each other in living out their Carmelite charism. Donor support for this meeting will make it possible for more sisters to participate, since not only the selected community delegates attend, but as a grass roots organization, the CCA General Assembly is open to all community members. Much of the meeting is also live-streamed to make it possible for those that cannot travel to engage. These meetings have been traditionally enriched by the presence of special guests from other US Carmelite association leadership and leaders of federations from abroad.

Desire, Darkness, and Hope

We are pleased to announce the publication by Liturgical Press of *Desire, Darkness, and HOPE: Theology in a Time of Impasse, Engaging the Thought of Constance FitzGerald, OCD*, edited by Laurie Cassidy and M. Shawn Copeland.

Sr. Constance is a member of the Baltimore Carmelite Community, a founding member of CCA, and a scholar. This book contains seven of her most important essays and ten critical essays discussing her work.

<u>Prior General's Letter to the Order on the Occasion of the Fourth</u> <u>Centenary of the Canonization of St. Teresa of Jesus</u>

Fr. Míceál O'Neill, the O. Carm. Prior General, is sending a letter to the members of the Order to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the canonization of Teresa of Avila on March 12, 1622. Here it is in part; for the full text, please go to https://www.ocarm.org/en/:

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I believe we are living through a moment of great grace in our Order. The news that Titus Brandsma will be canonized very soon has moved hearts and minds in every Carmelite community. The next few weeks will be



filled with the life and thoughts of this very saintly man. As I write this letter, I am conscious of a part of the life and thinking of Titus Brandsma that enriches the Carmelite Family in a very notable way, namely, his great interest in the life, experience, and writings of St. Teresa of Jesus.

On the 12th of March of this year, the Church will celebrate the fourth centenary of the canonization of Teresa of Avila, who was canonized on the same day as Ignatius of Loyola, Francis Xavier, Philip Neri and Isidore the Farmer. On that day, on the initiative of the Superior General of the Society of Jesus, there will a celebration of the five saints in the church of the Gesù in Rome. The new Superior General of the Discalced Carmelites, Fr. Miguel Márquez Calle, O.C.D., and myself have been invited to take part and to concelebrate with Pope Francis, as representatives of the Carmelite Family.

<u>Títus Brandsma</u>

Pope Francis announced the canonization of Blessed Titus Brandsma, O. Carm., will take place on Sunday, May 15, 2022, in St. Peter's Square. At last, Fr. Titus, 80 years after his death and 37 years from his beatification, can be venerated as a saint by the entire Catholic Church. The Carmelite Order, the Church in Holland, as well as the entire Carmelite Family, joyfully welcome this much awaited announcement.
