Spotlight on the President

In this issue we would like to introduce you to Sr. Colette Ackerman. She is a member of the Carmelite Sisters of Baltimore and is the current president of the CCA – working with a generous Leadership Team. When I asked her about her vision for the near-term future of CCA, she said that they have three main goals. One is to ensure that we make provisions for the long-term care of the sisters who need assistance. The second is to provide on-going support to our autonomous member communities and those in transition. The third is to provide organizational retreat time to discern future steps for CCA and to strategize about the means to accomplish them.

She also said that the membership is clear: It wants CCA to maintain its identity as a grass-roots organization. The sisters want to stay together and share this form of Carmelite life which has a unique contribution to make to our Church. It is also clear that these goals will require CCA to continue to maintain good financial practices that ensure fiduciary responsibility and stability – which it is doing.

In light of this, one goal of CCA's national meeting next year is to generate and approve a plan for a new leadership structure that is more suitable to this time in the organization's history. Another is to help both individual sisters and local communities articulate and acknowledge their new reality so that they can take the next steps on their journey. To this end the Leadership Team plans to be in continuing conversation with facilitators and canonists discerning a possible future form for CCA. The team will bring what is has learned to the sisters for reflection and to the 2025 meeting so that we may all continue to discern our future together.

Ongoing Formation

The CCA continues to provide its membership with on-going formation through its Women at the Well Dialogs. Recently Professor Craig Morrison, O.Carm. (https://www.biblico.it/professori/Morrison-CV.pdf), provided a very thoughtful presentation on Discernment. Among many very insightful comments, he discussed that "giving it all over to God is not discernment. God expects us to help God." An important part of discernment is reading the signs of the times. He mentioned in particular 1) the changing role of women in the world and 2) a highly educated populace. Given the current challenges that CCA and its communities face, he asked these very relevant questions: "How does hope guide discernment?" "What role does dislocation play in discernment?" As CCA and its communities focus on discerning what actions they need to take for its future, this presentation provided much food for thought and stimulus for community dialog.

Planning for the 2025 General Assembly

In early February the Leadership Team (LT) of the CCA traveled to its member Carmel in Reno, Nevada, for a combined sisterly visit and extended in-person meeting. The opportunity to dialog with the members of the community, listening to their experiences and participating in their community's liturgy and prayer was long overdue but deeply appreciated. The LT met and engaged in fruitful discussion regarding assessing progress towards the goals of the CCA as adopted at the last General Assembly. They began shaping plans for the next General Assembly in May 2025 with a focus on Goal 6: We have explored and proposed options for the future functioning of the CCA by the end of the upcoming tenure. A virtual discernment retreat with a session in June, followed by three days in September and a session in November, is currently planned with a focus on participants prayerfully and practically envisioning alternatives for the governance and functioning of the CCA.

Implementing Goal 2 -- In Rome!

At our General Assembly the membership reviewed and rearticulated organizational goals for the coming year. Our goal 2 has been important to us from the beginning. It reads: "We have continued to

work at achieving a representative voice in matters affecting our lives, the Teresian charism, and the Order." And so, we are pleased to announce that as a result of two recent Vatican Documents, and with the important support of Fr. Miguel, the General Superior of our Order, leaders from our worldwide order of Carmelite nuns have been invited to Rome to begin work on reformulating our Constitutions. Sr. Claire Sokol of the Reno Carmel, who is a past president of CCA, will represent us there. In the past others have written our Constitutions for us with only minor input from the ones who actually live this life! This is a new and exciting development! Our Goal 2 is coming to fruition, and you, our donors, play an important role in all of this because it is your generous contributions that enable us to participate in this exciting development.
