

## Member Evaluations of May 10, CCA Zoom Meeting



R#	Please provide comments on why you chose this rating.
1	Very important time to be together and to hear the sharing of the sister who have gone through affiliation.



R#	4. In listening to the shared experiences of Sr. Sue Lumb from Barrington, and some of the sisters from Clinton regarding their transitions, decision-making and current situation, how would you propose that CCA respond to this reality going forward?	
1	Not sure. We can try to stay in touch with communities as they go through this, but I sometimes feel like they don't welcome our help. Not sure what to do.	
2	Be as inclusive with these sisters as possible.	
3	Ask if there is anything specific we can do for our sisters to help. I think it would help others to accompany them them if they could make their needs/hopes known. The sharing we just had was a good example of how CCA can facilitate that. We need to be there for each other on a grass roots level, not leave it to the leadership alone.	
4	It seems that the LT is already doing a good job of helping transitional communities and that Shared Services are a great help to sisters negotiating the hurdles of decision-making and moving.	
5	I know that the two leadership groups have given and would always give anything they could to the transitioning monastery They/ you have, beyond a doubt, done everything they could and far more than would even be expected - especially in terms of time and energy. In some ways it is up to the monastery because they alone know what help they need. If the need were communicated the would be a responds of that I am sure.

9	From what I heard, the support these sisters received from the LT/TG, Nancy Reynolds, Kathleen Pruitt, outside organizations etc. has been amazing. The LT/TG (not sure who does what) are greatly to be commended for their loving service to our sisters in a terribly difficult time for everyone.  The decisions that had to be made by the communities are terribly difficult. But given the autonomous nature of our monasteries I'm not sure any of us could have done much more to help with the possible exception of reaching out personally to individuals and staying connected. But Unfortunately, COVID was a factor this past year that prevented more in-person support.  For years CCA has supported communities looking at the reality of their situations through speakers at our national meetings (NRRO etc), hearing presentations from the Oldenburg and Danville sisters about their experience, provided resources for facilitators, initiated sisterly visits etc all this by way of providing mutual active support for the needs of our communities. I believe CCA did all it could do. It's wonderful to imagine a retirement/infirmary monastery for Carmelites. But it's not practical for many reasons that have been explored and discussed over and over in the past. Partnering with other religious communities in sharing their facilities as Danville, Oldenburg and now Eldridge have done seems the most practical way to go. For this to work - communities need to form bonds with Apostolic religious and make plans sooner than later - especially if they hope to have several from one community re-locate to the same facility. I believe our future as religious may lie in sharing facilities - whether in retirement or not. I don't see this as loss but as a gain; a natural evolution of religious life in our time.		
10	It is hard to know as honestly from what I heard there can be problems accepting Sisters into a community that are difficult persons who caused problems in their former community. Helping them move out of their monastery. Perhaps clearing out the monastery; furniture and stuff either financially or physically		
11	It makes one appreciate what one has and yet the need for future planning, as well as a desire to support any affiliated community if possible in some way.		
12	If at all possible, invite Sisters no longer living in a Monastery to attend a joyful gathering at a Monastery nearby (if there is such), or maybe try a joyful celebration by Zoom.		
13	Seek ways of supporting decision- making in a more strategic planning method. 5 years out		
14	I feel that not only our Carmels, but also our Association, have/has to realistically look at what is our future. With only 5 autonomous monasteries and 2 or 3 of those being fragile, what is CCA's plan for the future. The issue of where sisters can go when they leave their monasteries is largely a problem of not having enough "thriving" monasteries within the Association. The fact that we have always honored the diversity among our membership also makes it difficult for a monastery to accept someone from another monastery that has a very different way of living the Carmelite Charism.		
15	It would have been good if we could have heard from them once or twice as they were going through the experience.  Suggestions from Sue and Clinton were given and it would be good to follow up on them.

19	I have no clear ideasI remember how, at least 20 years ago, our Dutch sisters encouraged us to see the signs of the times in our own CCA communities, to discuss, listen to each other, evaluate what is possible, and get expert help as we need it; to make plans sooner rather than laterI am also aware that CCA communities in the past (examples of Elysburg-Danville, Indianapolis-Oldenburg, Beacon, and their offer to share their space) have openly shared how they made their decisions to live their Carmelite vocations in different places/ways; Where I have found hope is in listening to and sharing with both Angela and Jean Alice who have acknowledged the hard work they and their communities had to do in making the moves they did AND how happy they are living and sharing their Carmelite contemplative vocations now. I believe that the Spirit is calling my own community (and CCA) to enter into the unknown together to discover even more new ways of living and sharing the richness of our spirituality.		

- 20 Discussion and maybe brainstorming at a future ZOOM meeting in dialog with the afffiliated communities about ways to support them. There are many different forms and levels of support. Make sure they have open channels to CCA leadership in ways that are comfortable for them. 21 I am very grateful that the sisters shared so openly and was inspired by their willingness to do so. I felt it was greater consciousness raising of what our sisters have & continue to go through. I'd like all of us in the association to take greater responsibility for our sisters who are in transition and for communities who are affiliating and moving toward completion. Begin to explore ways that we in CCA can reach out to our sisters in appropriate ways. There are confidentiality and boundary issues to be respected, but it is an enormous task for just the association president and council to handle. There are canonical, legal, financial issues that are clearly areas the president & council must be involved in. That is only one aspect of being a community of communities. Give time, dialogue, explain the reasons, prepare the persons before taking such difficult decisions. 22 23 I was surprised and saddened to learn that Clinton sisters did not feel the support of CCA during their transition. I think if Barrington had been more open to the reality of their situation and begun talking about the future a long time ago, their transition perhaps would be less painful and more peaceful. So even if they do not want to hear it, our Carmels need to be encouraged to look at their reality and lean into change instead of resisting it. I'm not sure if challenging and accompanying is the task of the TG? LT? 24 I think the two communities are well situated and can look to the future with peace. That said, the whole thing is a heartache to me. I feel very much for them and know it is in the future for more of our communities down the road. It is all in God's hands and I try to rest in that, and to cooperate with it! 25 Beyond what is happening now, including presence and prayer, I find it hard to think of now We are in a very difficult position because there is a factor which is really unknown - how Rome views 28 our individual monasteries and our association as a whole. For some monasteries local resources provide support that would strengthen future possibilities. We are just in fragile spaces where the outcome is unsure. I applaud Sue and the sisters from Clinton in providing their honest and candid responses. I really don't know, but it really breaks my heart to see our Carmelite sisters not being able to live in a 29 normal Carmelite Community as we do. May be, to let our sisters going through this situation feel the support in more tangible ways would mean a lot. What ways? May be the best way is to ask those who already experienced the situation, document it and learn the pros and cons of every decisions made for future references. Gather info, ideas and experiences from each Carmel. Work with the services we are now receiving for 30 CCA to create a picture of what could be helpful for the communities. CCA must make sure that each community has plans for the near future. 31 32 Continue to provide support to the communities. These are difficult realities. 33 Great openness to whatever ways the individual Communities might ask for assistance. It is very important for the Communities to be the first to reach out, as each might be ready. Readiness comes for different communities at different times. Then CCA could respond according the requests. 34 This could be the future of all our CCA and we need to open communication. CCA seems, in this case,, to be the "we" and an individual Carmel member would be the "I". How do the "We" offer the contact and emotional support in times of the pain of separation and closer of a Carmel? With great compassion for our Sisters, listening to their experience, learning from them and encouraging 36 communities that might have to undergo same experience in the future.
